# Introduction

The Information, Education and Communication (IEC) component under the Swachh Bharat Mission Urban 2.0 (SBM-U 2.0) serves as the driving force behind behavioural transformation and citizen participation in the journey towards a cleaner, greener and more sustainable India. In Jammu & Kashmir, the Housing & Urban Development Department (HUDD) has been steering this mission with a vision to not only create infrastructure but also to nurture a strong sense of ownership, responsibility and civic pride among urban residents.

To translate this vision into meaningful community action, Swaaha Resource Pvt. Ltd. was entrusted with the implementation of IEC activities across 80 Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) of Jammu & Kashmir. Over the last six months, the project has focused on creating multi-layered awareness, fostering behavioural change and amplifying the message of cleanliness through creative campaigns, events, digital outreach and on-ground citizen engagement.

This booklet is a compendium of those efforts documenting the key campaigns, activities, and success stories that shaped the IEC journey from January to June 2025. Each month reflects a unique theme aligned with the mission's objectives from promoting source segregation and plastic waste management to celebrating **“Swachhtantra” - Gantantra se Desh Mahaan, Swachhta Se Desh Ki Shaan**, **“Chaar Bin Apnao, Prakriti Bachao”**, **Green Colony Campaign**, **“Mera Shehar, Meri Pehchaan”**, **Har Shaniwar Swachhta Tyohaar - Every Saturday, A Cleaner J&K – Phase 1** Beyond numbers and activities, the IEC journey represents the collective spirit of collaboration among ULBs, mission officials, Safai Mitras, SHGs, school students and citizens who came together to transform the idea of cleanliness into a community culture.

Through this 6-month documentation, we aim to present not just the outcomes, but the impact of communication-led transformation how awareness, participation and creativity together have become powerful tools for sustainable urban change under SBM 2.0 in Jammu & Kashmir.

# Preface

The Government of India launched the second phase of the Swachh Bharat Mission (Urban) – SBM-U 2.0 – in October 2021 under the Ministry of Housing & Urban Affairs (MoHUA). This five-year mission (2021–26) has a total outlay of 1,41,600 crore and aims to consolidate and sustain India’s urban sanitation achievements. Its vision is to make every city ‘Garbage Free’ through 100% source segregation of waste, door-to-door collection and scientific processing of all municipal solid waste. SBM-U 2.0 also mandates comprehensive liquid waste management: no untreated sewage or faecal sludge may be discharged into the environment, as all used water (sewage, greywater and blackwater) will be safely collected, transported, treated and reused under a new Used Water Management component. Legacy waste dumpsites will be remediated and converted into green spaces to promote a circular economy.

SBM-U 2.0 builds on the sweeping gains of Phase I (2014–2021). Under the first phase, over 70 lakh individual, community and public toilets were constructed, and Urban India was declared open-defecation free (ODF) in 2019. Many cities have since achieved higher standards under MoHUA’s protocols (ODF+ and ODF++ certifications). The mission also achieved near-universal waste management: 100% door-to-door collection was achieved in 97% of urban wards with source-segregation in 85% of wards. These measures quadrupled India’s waste processing rate (from 18% of waste in 2014 to over 70% today). The success of Phase I was driven by a massive jan-andolan (people’s movement), in which over 20 crore urban citizens participated under intensive behavior-change campaigns. To strengthen this progress, SBM-U 2.0 has launched a National Behavior Change Communication framework focusing on source segregation, waste processing, plastic reduction and responsible sanitation practices.

In the Union Territory of Jammu & Kashmir, SBM-U 2.0 is being implemented across all 80 Urban Local Bodies (ULBs). Over the past year the Jammu & Kashmir Housing & Urban Development Department (JKHUDD) has organized a multiple IEC campaigns in these ULBs to mobilize citizens for the Swachhata mission. Activities have included community cleanup drives, street plays, open painting and quiz competitions, and digital outreach – all designed to promote waste segregation, proper disposal and civic pride. This IEC booklet has been prepared to support those efforts on the ground. It provides ULB officials, NGOs, citizens and other stakeholders with practical information on sanitation practices, waste management technologies, and communication strategies. By outlining key measures, responsibilities and best practices (including estimated costs and operation plans), the booklet aims to translate SBM-U 2.0’s goals into concrete actions. It is hoped that all stakeholders will find this booklet a useful guide for making Jammu & Kashmir’s cities cleaner, healthier and more sustainable.

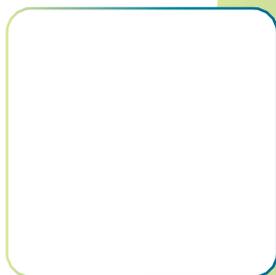

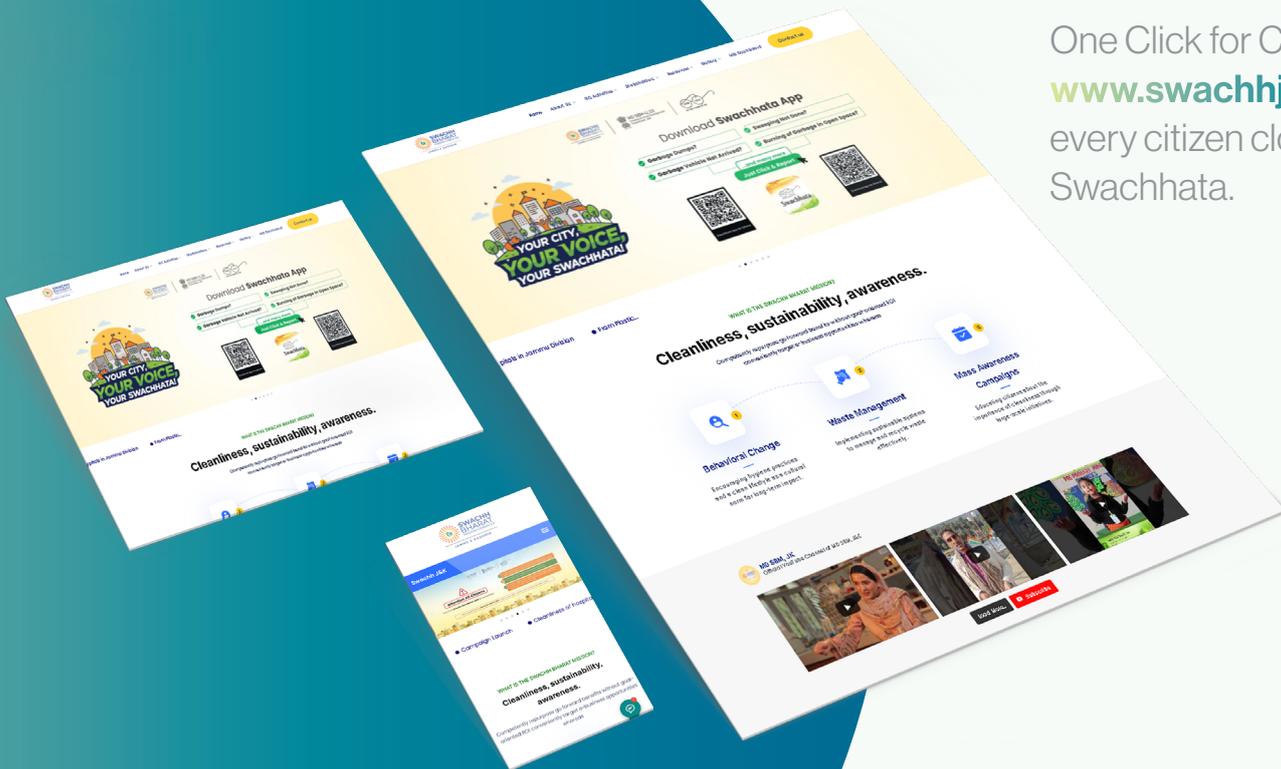
Structured around the mission's thematic priorities, the website includes sections on Solid Waste Management, ODF, ODF+ and ODF++ Sustainabil-

# Bridging the Gaps, Boosting the Rankings



A Comprehensive  
**Gap Analysis** under  
**SBM-U 2.0** across  
Jammu & Kashmir

## Strengthening the Road to Clean & Sustainable Urban Futures

As Jammu & Kashmir strides forward under the Swachh Bharat Mission–Urban 2.0, the focus has shifted from just building infrastructure to sustaining it — ensuring that every ULB not only achieves but maintains national standards of cleanliness and sanitation.

To accelerate this progress, a detailed Gap Analysis Exercise was undertaken across all 80 Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) under the guidance of the Jammu & Kashmir Housing & Urban Development Department (JKHUDD).

**The exercise aimed to benchmark each ULB’s performance against the key certification and ranking frameworks of the Ministry of Housing & Urban Affairs (MoHUA) — including:**

Open Defecation Free (ODF +), ODF++, and Garbage-Free City (GFC) certifications, along with preparedness for Swachh Survekshan 2024.

This initiative formed a vital part of the Information, Education and Communication (IEC) project implemented by Swaaha Resource Pvt. Ltd., designed to transform insights from the ground into actionable improvements for each ULB.

## **Purpose:** Setting the Foundation for Smarter Cities

The Gap Analysis was more than an assessment it was a performance improvement journey. The key objectives were:

1. To evaluate each ULB’s compliance with the Swachh Survekshan 2024 Toolkit and MoHUA’s certification standards.
2. To assess the functionality, maintenance, and usability of Community Toilets (CTs) and Public Toilets (PTs).
3. To identify gaps in solid and liquid waste management, citizen feedback systems, and documentation processes.
4. To provide each ULB with technical guidance, checklists, and an actionable roadmap for improvement before national-level field assessments.
5. To help cities attain sustainable sanitation practices, leading to ODF+, ODF++ and GFC compliance.

This exercise served as a crucial diagnostic tool — ensuring that Jammu & Kashmir’s urban local bodies are not only clean, but ready, verified, and ranked on par with India’s leading smart and sustainable cities.



# The Three-Phase Journey of Analysis and Improvement

The entire Gap Analysis was meticulously structured into three progressive phases, ensuring that every insight translated into measurable improvement.

## Phase 1: Baseline Gap Identification — The Ground Reality Check

The first phase began at the very grassroots — doorstep assessments and toilet inspections across every ward and ULB. Dedicated teams of Swachhata Executives and field staff conducted extensive field surveys of all Community Toilets (CTs) and Public Toilets (PTs).

Each facility was evaluated for:

- Infrastructure quality and functionality,
  - Cleanliness and hygiene standards,
  - Accessibility and user comfort,
  - Availability of water and handwashing facilities,
  - Signage, lighting, and maintenance mechanisms.
- The aim was to identify small but critical gaps that could directly affect ODF and ODF++ certification scores.

Following this baseline survey, ULB-specific corrective action plans were prepared, enabling quick interventions such as repairing non-functional toilets, improving cleanliness contracts, and standardizing monitoring protocols before the Swachh Survekshan 2024 evaluation began.

## Phase 2: Comprehensive Evaluation under the Swachh Survekshan Toolkit

Building on the baseline data, Phase 2 aligned directly with the Swachh Survekshan 2024 Toolkit — India's most comprehensive urban cleanliness framework, consisting of 10 indicators and 166 sub-indicators worth 10,000 marks.

This phase assessed each ULB across:

- **Service-Level Progress:** Solid and liquid waste management infrastructure,
- **Citizen Feedback:** Mechanisms for public participation and complaint resolution,
- **Innovation and Digital Initiatives:** Use of tech-based monitoring,
- **IEC Activities:** Behavior change campaigns and community engagement.

Teams used standardized formats and geo-tagged checklists to ensure data accuracy and comparability across districts.

ULBs received detailed advisory reports highlighting strengths and improvement areas — from achieving 100% door-to-door collection and segregation at source, to maintaining clean public spaces and efficient waste processing facilities.

These findings became the foundation for each ULB's internal "Swachhata Readiness Plan", ensuring preparedness well before the MoHUA field assessments.

## Phase 3: Follow-Up and Verification — From Plans to Performance

The final phase was dedicated to verification and validation. After corrective measures were implemented, re-assessment surveys were conducted across all ULBs.

Each public and community toilet was revisited to evaluate the effectiveness of interventions — from infrastructure upgrades to improved maintenance contracts.

The teams collected geo-tagged photographic evidence of improvements, mapped facility-level updates, and cross-referenced data with MoHUA's Section 4 parameters.



Verification made the invisible visible showing the tangible progress made by every city.

This phase ensured transparency, accountability, and measurable progress tracking — hallmarks of SBM-U 2.0's evidence-based governance model.

## Key Observations and Learnings

The Gap Analysis uncovered not just gaps — but opportunities for growth:

- ULBs demonstrated strong progress in door-to-door collection and plastic waste segregation.
- Several cities developed innovative citizen feedback models, leveraging digital surveys and social media.

- Consistent IEC campaigns resulted in higher citizen awareness and Swachhata participation.
- Field-level data helped prioritize investments for public toilet maintenance and waste processing units.

Overall, the exercise helped convert data into actionable insight, ensuring that cleanliness is not a one-time drive but a continuous improvement process.

# Outcomes

## Preparing J&K for the National Stage

By the end of this period, all 80 ULBs had completed structured improvement cycles a first-of-its-kind coordinated initiative under SBM-U 2.0 in Jammu & Kashmir.

The outcome was multi-dimensional:

- Enhanced certification readiness for ODF+, ODF++, GFC, and Swachh Survekshan 2024.
- Improved infrastructure maintenance and sanitation service delivery.
- Greater data transparency and reporting accuracy through geo-tagged documentation.
- Strengthened collaboration between ULBs and citizens, making Swachhata a shared civic culture.
- This Gap Analysis not only prepared Jammu & Kashmir's cities for national ranking but also set a new standard for evidence-based governance and performance improvement under SBM-U 2.0.

## Conclusion

### From Evaluation to Evolution

The Gap Analysis was more than a technical assessment it was a transformative exercise that bridged the distance between policy and practice. It helped local bodies understand their strengths, address shortcomings, and evolve into citizen-centric, clean, and sustainable cities.

As Jammu & Kashmir continues its journey under Swachh Bharat Mission Urban 2.0, this exercise stands as a blueprint for continuous progress, proving that with data, dedication, and participation, every city can move closer to becoming a Garbage-Free, ODF++ certified, and nationally recognized model of Swachhata.



# Driving Urban Excellence through Capacity Building

“Empowering Urban Local Bodies through Knowledge and Action”

**R**ecognizing that strong systems are built on skilled hands and informed minds, multiple intensive Capacity-Building Sessions were organized under the guidance of the Mission Director, Swachh Bharat Mission–Urban 2.0, by Swaaha IEC Team for officials and field teams of the Jammu & Kashmir Housing & Urban Development Department (JKHUDD), Jammu & Kashmir.

Spanning six months and covering both Jammu and Kashmir divisions, these sessions served as dynamic platforms to equip Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) with the knowledge, confidence, and practical tools needed to plan, execute and document IEC initiatives effectively.

Focusing on real-world application, the trainings emphasized 3R principles (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle), Source Segregation, and Mobile-based Multimedia Production, aligning every learning outcome with MoHUA’s Swachh Survekshan 2024 parameters. Participants learned to transform local challenges into success stories using creativity, community engagement and data-backed monitoring.

More than workshops, these sessions became incubators of leadership and innovation. They empowered all stakeholders across 80 ULBs to turn awareness into sustained action driving Jammu & Kashmir closer to its vision of becoming a cleaner, smarter and nationally competitive region under SBM-U 2.0.

# Strengthening Readiness for Swachh Survekshan 2024

Preparations and Field Support for Swachh Survekshan 2024, ODF+ & ODF++ & GFC Certifications

**F**rom February to April 2025, the focus of the IEC Team under the Mission Directorate, SBM–Urban 2.0, shifted from campaigns to strategic groundwork and certification preparedness.

During this crucial period, intensive efforts were undertaken to strengthen the capacity, coordination, and readiness of 80 Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) of

Jammu & Kashmir for the upcoming Swachh Survekshan 2024, ODF+ / ODF++ and Garbage-Free City (GFC) certifications.

The months were marked by rigorous planning, data validation, on-ground assistance, and performance enhancement sessions all aimed at ensuring that each ULB was well-prepared, well-documented, and confident ahead of national-level assessments.

## Part I: Preparation for Swachh Survekshan, ODF+, ODF++ and GFC Certifications

To build clarity and consistency in performance, a series of exclusive preparatory sessions were organized for Chief Executive Officers (CEOs), District Executive Officers (DEOs), and Field Functionaries of all ULBs.

These sessions, conducted under the guidance of the Mission Director, SBM-U 2.0, emphasized technical learning, evidence-based reporting, and alignment with MoHUA's national evaluation parameters.



### Key Focus Areas:

- Understanding Swachh Survekshan 2024 Toolkit and certification benchmarks.
- Strengthening documentation processes, data accuracy, and evidence collection.
- Ensuring sustainability of ODF practices and community toilet maintenance.
- Improving source segregation, door-to-door waste collection, and scientific processing.
- Promoting citizen engagement mechanisms and transparent communication.

Through a mix of interactive presentations, mock assessments, and on-ground demonstrations, the sessions empowered officials to confidently navigate MoHUA's evaluation process from uploading data on the Swachhata portal to conducting self-assessment audits.

## Outcome: A More Prepared Urban Force

By the end of the preparatory phase, officials across all ULBs were equipped with clear roadmaps for improvement and technical know-how to meet certification requirements.

This phase built a strong foundation for achieving

higher benchmarks under ODF+, ODF++ and GFC categories, aligning Jammu & Kashmir's cities with the national goals of SBM-U 2.0 sustainability, accountability and citizen-centric sanitation.

## Part II: On-Ground Support for ODF & GFC Field Assessments 2024

As the ODF and GFC Field Assessments 2024 commenced across Jammu & Kashmir, the IEC Team Swaaha played a pivotal role in ensuring smooth facilitation, coordination, and real-time support at every stage.

### Key Interventions:

- Conducted pre-assessment site inspections in coordination with ULBs to identify focus locations — including schools, water bodies, parks, markets, and tourist areas.
- Ensured documentation readiness by organizing MoUs, notifications, log-books, and registers at Material Recovery Facilities (MRFs), composting units, and Public/Community Toilets (CTs/PTs).
- Assisted ULBs in creating visual evidence banks through geo-tagged photographs and digital reports.
- Facilitated citizen feedback interactions and awareness sessions to help assessors directly engage with residents.
- Supported real-time communication between field teams, assessors, and local officials for smoother evaluation.

The approach ensured that assessors not only witnessed the physical transformation of cities but also experienced the active participation and ownership of citizens — a true reflection of SBM-U 2.0's spirit.

## Outcome: Smooth Assessments, Stronger Performance

The coordinated efforts resulted in:

- Seamless assessment facilitation across all 80 ULBs.
- Enhanced documentation and transparency at every level.
- Improved feedback and satisfaction scores from citizens during assessor visits.
- Positive visibility and preparedness that reflected in better Swachh Survekshan outcomes.

## Conclusion: From Preparation to Progress

The February–April period showcased how capacity building and coordination can be as impactful as public campaigns. By strengthening the knowledge base, improving documentation, and fostering collaboration between ULBs and citizens, the IEC Project under SBM-U 2.0 transformed readiness into performance.

With these structured efforts, Jammu & Kashmir emerged more confident, better equipped, and strategically positioned to achieve ODF+, ODF++, GFC and improved national rankings reaffirming its commitment to a clean, sustainable and well-governed urban future.

Developed under the IEC Project of the Mission Director, SBM-U 2.0, this modern facility serves as the central creative hub for producing professional Information, Education, and Communication (IEC) materials for all 80 Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) across Jammu & Kashmir.

The studio is fully equipped with advanced audio-visual systems, soundproof recording infrastructure, and digital editing suites—enabling high-quality, in-house production of awareness videos, jingles, documentaries, podcasts, voiceovers, and social

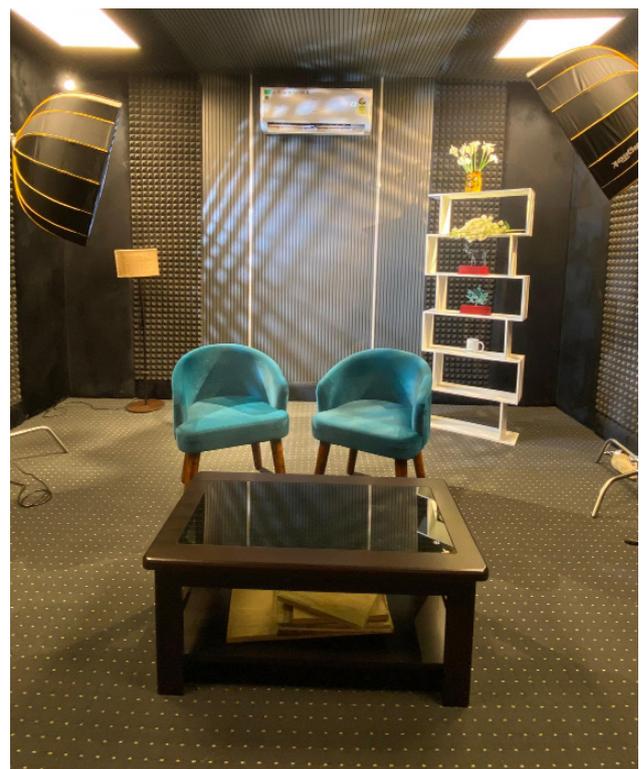
media content. Its establishment has significantly enhanced the capacity to conceptualize, record, and deliver impactful campaigns quickly, efficiently, and with professional finesse.

## Outcome:

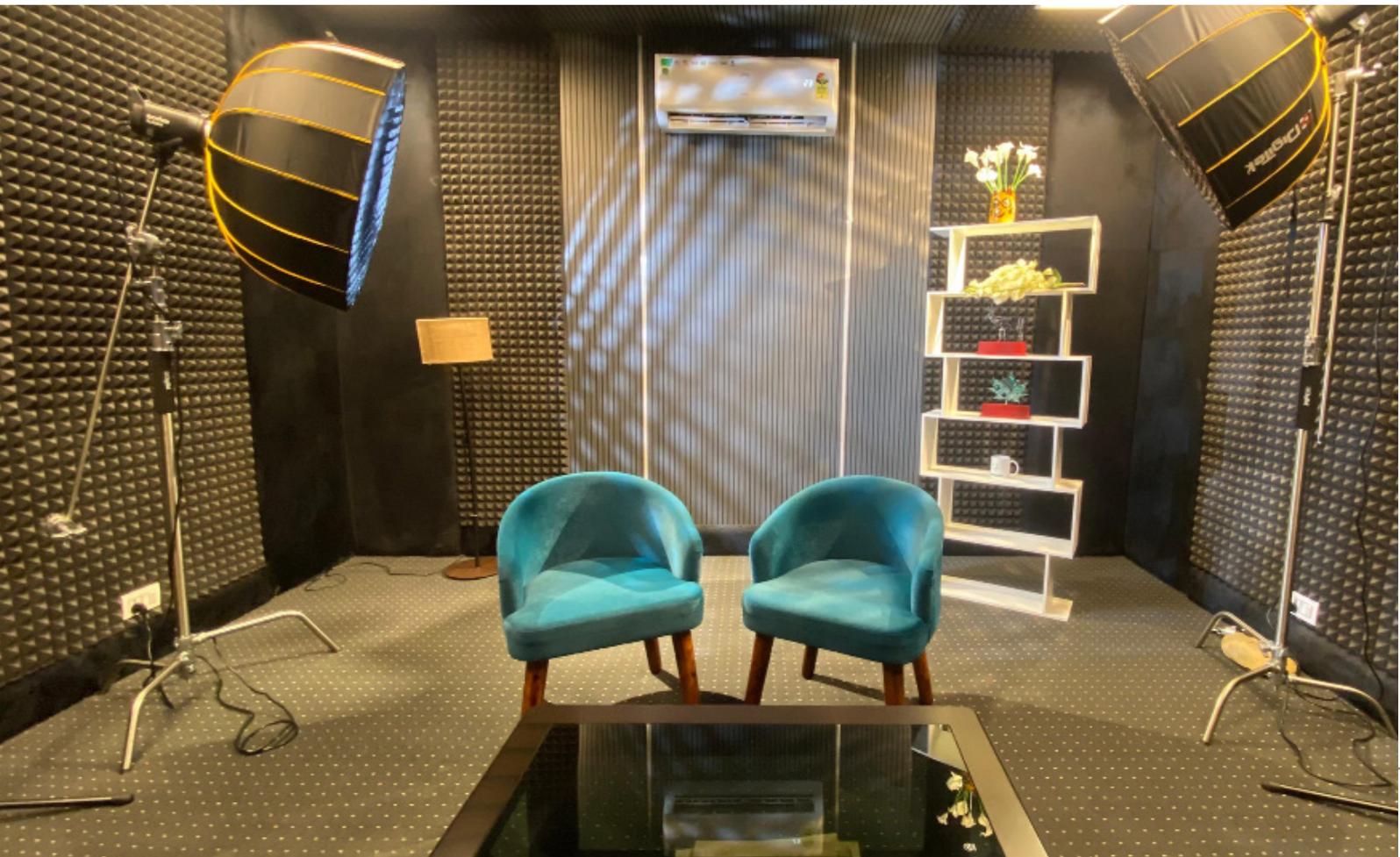

## When Cleanliness Became Patriotism

### Launch of Jammu & Kashmir's Pre-Republic Day Swachhta Campaign

**A**s the tricolor prepared to rise high across the nation, the Housing & Urban Development Department (HUDD), Government of Jammu & Kashmir, launched a one-of-its-kind cleanliness campaign that blended national pride with civic responsibility.

Under the banner of Swachh Bharat Mission-Urban 2.0, the campaign titled **"Swachh Tantra: Gantantra Ki Shaan, Swachhta Se Bane Mahaan"** turned the pre-Republic Day period of January 2025 into a state-wide celebration of collective action, cleanli-

ness, and sustainability.

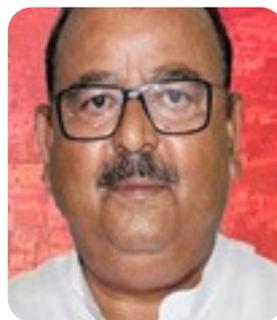

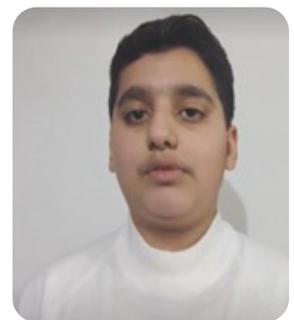

# Survey of 4 Best Schools

## “Recognizing Champions of Clean and Creative Learning Spaces”

**A**s part of the Swachh Survekshan 2024 preparations under the Swachh Bharat Mission–Urban 2.0, a comprehensive survey was conducted across all 80 Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) of Jammu & Kashmir to identify the four best-performing schools in each area. The initiative aimed to acknowledge institutions that have successfully embedded the principles of cleanliness, hygiene, and environmental stewardship into their daily learning environments.

The evaluation followed the official Swachh Survekshan Toolkit parameters, ensuring a standardized and transparent selection process. Each school

was assessed on its overall cleanliness, solid and liquid waste management practices, availability and maintenance of separate toilets for boys and girls, and the level of student engagement in Swachhata activities. Beyond infrastructure and maintenance, schools were also recognized for their innovative IEC interventions including wall art, morning assembly awareness sessions, waste segregation corners, student-led cleanliness drives and creative competitions. These initiatives not only enhanced the school environment but also nurtured a generation of young “Swachhata Ambassadors” who take pride in leading by example.

### Key Evaluation Parameters:

- Clean and well-maintained premises with active student participation.  
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- Effective waste segregation and disposal mechanisms within the school campus.

- Gender-sensitive sanitation facilities, ensuring dignity and comfort for all.
- Integration of Swachhata themes into school activities, assemblies and art projects.  
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- Community outreach efforts promoting hygiene and cleanliness awareness beyond school boundaries.

### Outcome:

The Survey of 4 Best Schools successfully recognized and celebrated educational institutions that embody the spirit of “Clean Campus, Green Campus.” By integrating cleanliness with creativity and student leadership, these schools have emerged as model learning environments under SBM–U 2.0 proving that when young minds embrace Swachhata, a sustainable and cleaner future is within reach.

The identified schools have become beacons of behavioural change, demonstrating how disciplined hygiene habits, teamwork, and creativity can transform educational spaces into models of Swachhata. Their efforts have directly contributed to improved community awareness and inspired replication in neighbouring institutions.

From market walls and school boundaries to parks and municipal buildings, every painted message stood as a symbol of civic pride and participation. The initiative also provided a platform for local talent and youth expression, bridging creativity with social purpose. The walls, once dull and unnoticed, are now colorful ambassadors of change, reflecting the aspirations of a clean, aware, and united Jammu & Kashmir.

# From Dumpsites to Dignified Spaces

## Transformation of Garbage Vulnerable Points (GVPs)

Under the Swachh Bharat Mission–Urban 2.0, Jammu & Kashmir has witnessed one of the most visible and inspiring urban cleanliness transformations—the revival of over **650 Garbage Vulnerable Points (GVPs)** across 80 Urban Local Bodies (ULBs).

Once unsightly and unhygienic corners marred by open dumping, these locations have now been completely reimaged into clean, vibrant, and functional community spaces. The transformation reflects a remarkable synergy between municipal teams, sanitation workers, local citizens, and volunteers, all united by one mission to reclaim their surroundings from waste.

Each transformation drive began with extensive cleaning, waste removal, and segregation efforts, during which over **4,800 metric tonnes** of mixed waste were collected and scientifically processed

through authorized systems. The cleaned spaces were then beautified through creative interventions—wall murals with Swachhata messages, colorful planters, seating arrangements, and awareness signage that remind citizens to keep their surroundings clean.

The initiative has gone beyond beautification—it has fundamentally changed public behaviour and perception. Citizens who once walked past heaps of garbage now take ownership of these spaces, ensuring they remain clean and functional. Regular monitoring by ULB teams, coupled with local community engagement, has helped sustain these achievements and prevent re-accumulation of waste. The transformed GVPs today stand as living symbols of change—proof that collective effort and civic awareness can turn even the most neglected corners into models of cleanliness and sustainability.

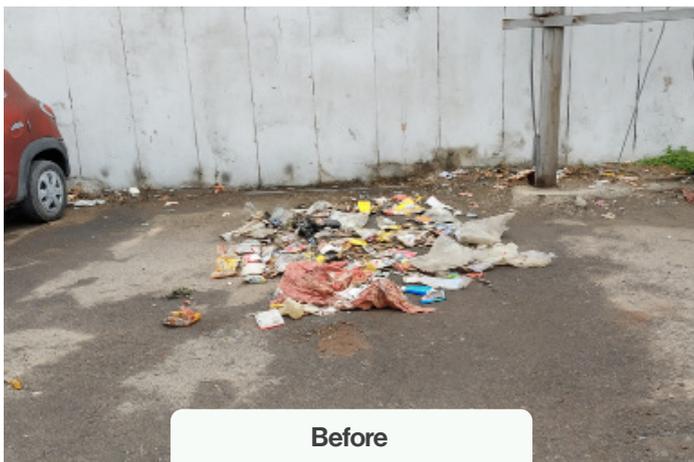

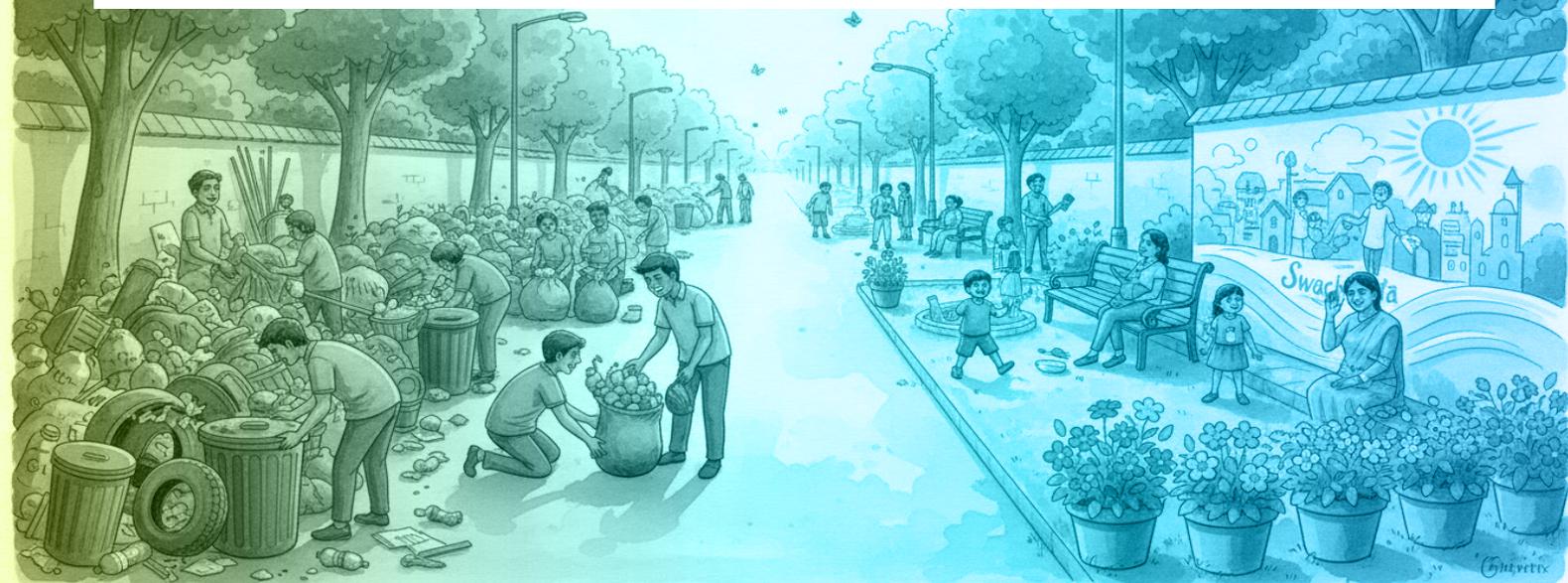

# Building Brilliance Before the Survey: Empowering ULBs for Swachh Survekshan 2024

## Online Capacity Building Sessions and Trainings

Recognizing that knowledge and preparedness are key drivers of success, a series of Online Capacity Building Sessions and Training Programs were organized under the Swachh Bharat Mission–Urban 2.0 to equip Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) across Jammu & Kashmir with the skills and understanding required to excel in Swachh Survekshan 2024.

The initiative, conducted under the guidance of the Mission Director, SBM-U 2.0, focused on strength-

ening institutional capacity through structured online learning, practical insights, and hands-on familiarization with the latest Swachh Survekshan Toolkit and its evaluation parameters.

Through a blend of virtual trainings, interactive presentations, and experience-sharing sessions, participants gained clarity on new assessment indicators, data management protocols, and evidence-based documentation processes required for improved performance in the national rankings.

Each session was designed to be interactive and outcome-oriented, allowing city teams to discuss challenges, clarify toolkit interpretations, and adopt best practices from across the country. Special emphasis was placed on data-driven governance, real-time monitoring, and evidence collection to align local performance with national-level evalu-

ation criteria. These online trainings bridged geographical barriers, bringing together officials from both Jammu and Kashmir divisions into a shared learning ecosystem. The initiative also reinforced collaboration among municipal executives, sanitation teams, and IEC professionals building a unified front for Swachhata success.

## Outcome:

The Online Capacity Building Program under SBM-U 2.0 has played a pivotal role in creating a technically sound, confident, and proactive urban workforce.

By enhancing understanding of assessment parameters and promoting data transparency, these sessions have empowered Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) to not only improve their Swachh Survekshan 2024 rankings but also to embed sustainable sanitation practices within their governance frameworks. Crucially, the MIS (Management Information System) team Swaaha was intricately involved in the design and delivery of this capacity building program. Their essential contribution ensured that the program effectively leveraged data transparency and robust information management. The team's expertise was key in training the urban workforce on the precise use of MIS tools, which are fundamental for accurate data reporting, real-time performance tracking, and the comprehensive understanding of the Swachh Survekshan assessment parameters. This direct involvement of the MIS team Swaaha significantly augmented the technical capacity of the ULBs, helping them to transition from basic compliance to data-driven, sustainable sanitation governance.



# Establishment of RRR Centers

“Turning Waste into Resources for a Sustainable Future”

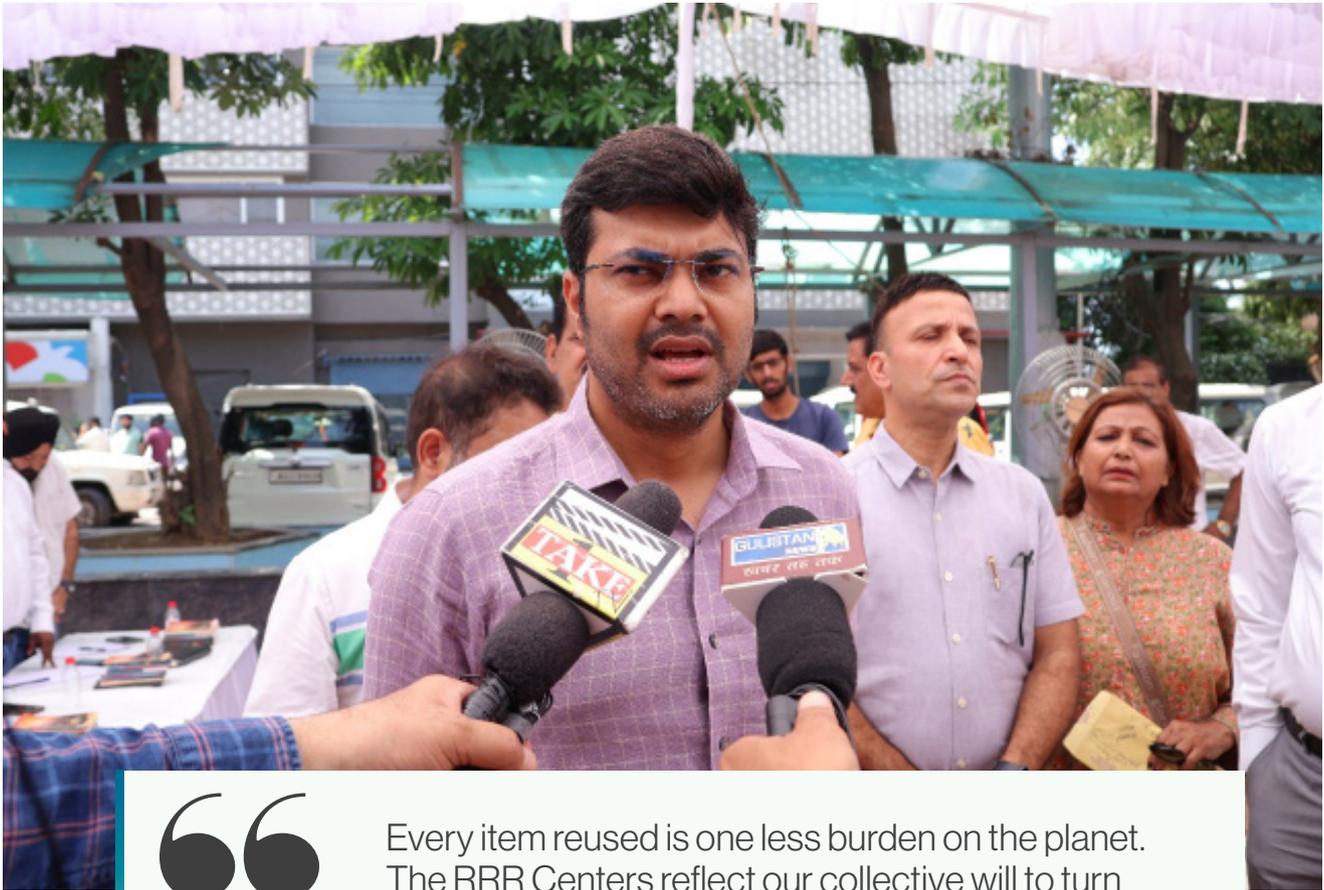
Under the visionary guidance of the Mission Director, Swachh Bharat Mission–Urban 2.0, a remarkable step toward sustainability was achieved with the establishment of **92 RRR** (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle) Centers across 80 Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) in the Union Territory of Jammu & Kashmir. These centers have emerged as vibrant community hubs, redefining how citizens view and handle waste. By encouraging people to donate, exchange and repurpose usable household items such as clothes, books, toys, furniture, and plastic goods, RRR Centers transform what was once considered waste into a resource of value and purpose. Notably, among these centers, “The Kindness Exchange” was established in the Jammu Municipal Corporation, serving as a prime example of this community-driven initiative.

More than mere collection points, these centers are symbols of shared responsibility and circular economy in action. They empower citizens to contribute meaningfully to waste reduction and resource conservation, while also nurturing a culture of mindful consumption and environmental stewardship. Through awareness drives, donation camps, and creative IEC interventions, communities across Jammu & Kashmir have embraced the message that sustainability begins with small, everyday choices. The initiative has not only diverted significant quantities of reusable materials away from landfills but has also created livelihood opportunities for informal waste workers and self-help groups engaged in sorting, refurbishing, and recycling.

## Outcome:

The establishment of RRR Centers under SBM-U 2.0 marks a transformative milestone in Jammu & Kashmir’s journey toward a circular economy. By linking environmental awareness with social impact, the initiative embodies the spirit of “Waste to Wealth” – reducing landfill dependency, inspiring community participation and shaping a cleaner, greener, and more sustainable future for all.

### Outcome:

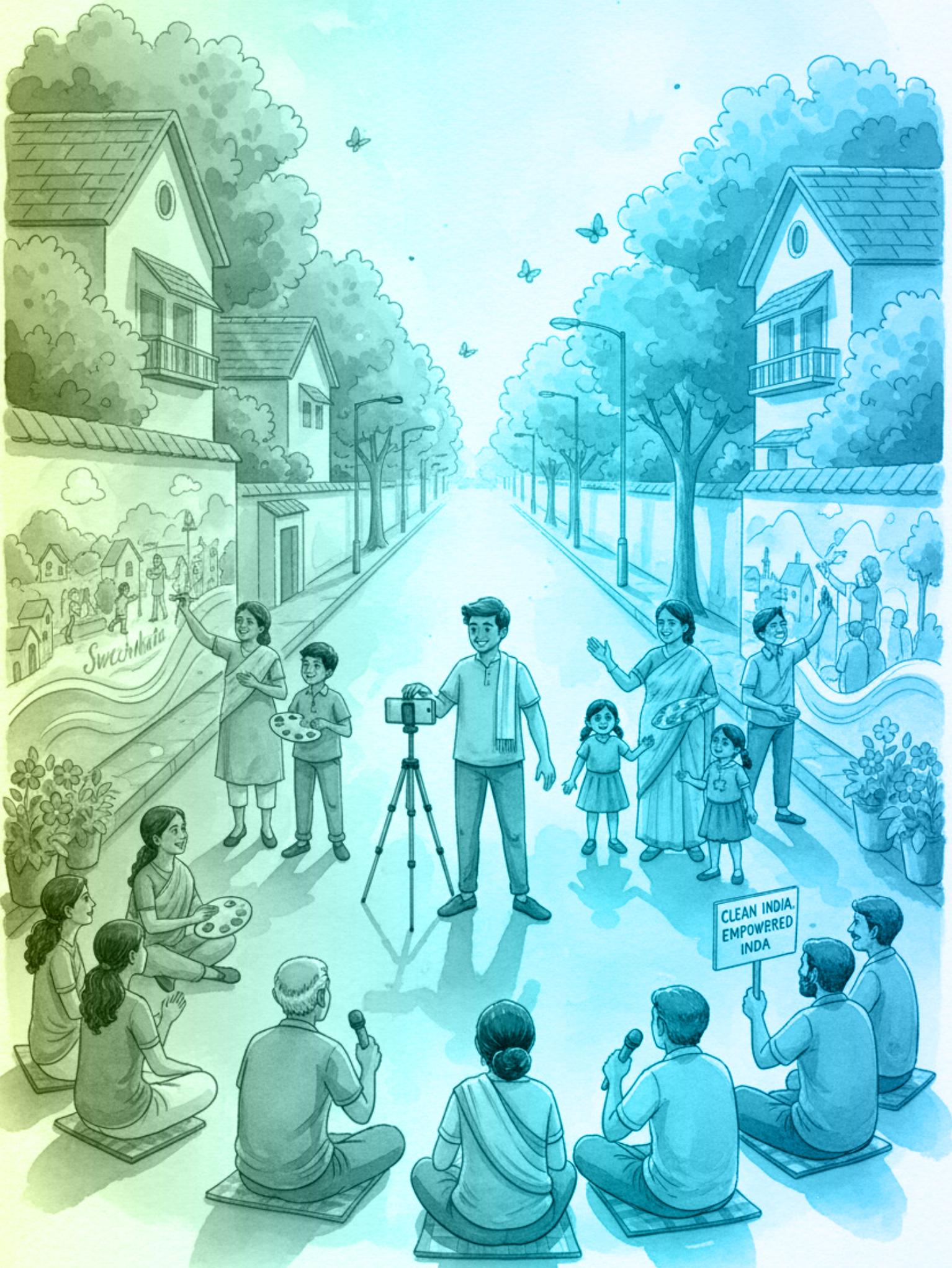

# Citizens Speak for Swachhata

In the journey toward cleaner and more livable cities, the voices of citizens have emerged as the most powerful drivers of change. Under Swachh Survekshan 2024, citizen feedback became a cornerstone of performance evaluation bridging the gap between policy and people, and ensuring that every resident’s experience contributed to shaping better urban services.

Across 80 Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) of Jammu & Kashmir, residents actively participated by sharing their views, experiences, and suggestions on various aspects of cleanliness, waste management, and sanitation services. This real-time feedback enabled city authorities to gain direct insights into on-ground realities, identify gaps, and implement swift corrective actions. The initiative strengthened

the Citizen Voice & Engagement component of Swachh Survekshan 2024, encouraging people to see themselves not just as beneficiaries but as active partners in governance. The collected feedback became an invaluable tool for enhancing transparency, accountability, and trust between citizens and municipal authorities. This open communication loop also helped improve service delivery, with ULBs using citizen suggestions to enhance door-to-door collection, public toilet maintenance, and waste segregation systems. Against a target of 123091 citizen responses, a total of 167889 feedback entries were successfully recorded across all participating ULBs achieving a 100% participation rate and reflecting the growing civic pride and awareness among the people of Jammu & Kashmir.

# Chaar Bin Apnao, **Prakriti Bachao!**

“Har Kachre ka Bin Apna, Kachra Mukht Shehar Apna!”

To promote responsible waste management and reinforce the principles of source segregation, the Jammu & Kashmir Housing & Urban Development Department (JKHUDD) under the Swachh Bharat Mission–Urban 2.0 launched the impactful campaign “**Chaar Bin Apnao, Prakriti Bachao!**” across all 80 Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) of Jammu & Kashmir.

The campaign encouraged citizens to adopt a four-bin waste segregation system, empowering households and institutions to manage waste efficiently at the source. Each bin was assigned a distinct color and purpose: Blue Bin – Dry Recyclable, Green Bin – Wet/Biodegradable Waste, Red Bin – Sanitary Waste, Black Bin – Domestic Hazardous Waste.

Through continuous IEC interventions such as awareness rallies, school workshops, street plays, and door-to-door campaigns, the initiative motivated communities to rethink their waste habits and become active partners in the Swachhata movement.

The campaign also focused on improving waste collection efficiency and reducing landfill pressure by ensuring proper segregation at the household level. Local bodies worked closely with sanitation teams to distribute color-coded bins, conduct demonstration drives, and display visual guides on proper disposal practices. By connecting environmental consciousness with everyday action, “Chaar Bin Apnao, Prakriti Bachao” has become a symbol of behavioral change and a step forward in achieving the vision of Kachra Mukht Shehar (Garbage-Free Cities) across Jammu & Kashmir.

# Building a Responsible Green Colony

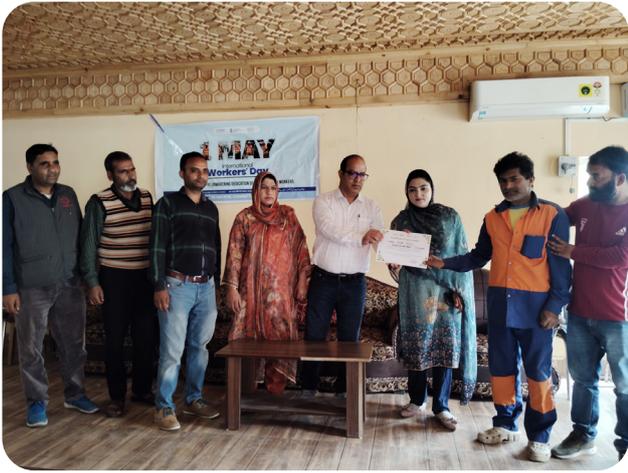
- “Plant a Tree for Every Sanitation Worker”

- Health & Wellness Camps -Dedicated medical check-up camps were organized across all ULBs to ensure the health, safety, and hygiene of sanitation staff. Doctors and paramedical teams conducted routine screenings, provided essential medicines, and spread awareness on occupational safety and personal hygiene.
- Recognition & Appreciation Ceremonies  
Local ULBs hosted small felicitation events where sanitation workers were recognized for their outstanding service. Certificates, mementos, and token of appreciation were distributed to celebrate their contribution to Swachh Bharat Mission (Urban) 2.0.

## A Celebration Beyond One Day

The International Workers' Day celebrations went beyond symbolic gestures it became a movement of gratitude, compassion, and shared responsibility. By recognizing sanitation workers as “Swachhata Warriors,” the campaign strengthened their morale and positioned them as central figures in the success of SBM-U 2.0.

The initiative reaffirmed that clean cities are built on teamwork between citizens who care, authorities who plan, and workers who execute with unwavering dedication. It reminded everyone that “Swachhata is not just about clean streets, but about respect, empathy, and dignity for those who make cleanliness possible.”

The celebration united communities, inspired civic pride, and elevated the social status of sanitation workers across Jammu & Kashmir. It showcased how compassion and collaboration can transform Swachhata from a mission into a movement of humanity and dignity.





# Mera Shehar, Meri Pehchaan: Citizens Redefining Urban Pride

“Dignity in Every Duty, Pride in Every Effort”

Under the Swachh Bharat Mission (Urban) 2.0, the Housing & Urban Development Department (HU&DD), Government of Jammu & Kashmir, launched a transformative citizen-led campaign titled “Mera Shehar, Meri Pehchaan” across all 80 Urban Local Bodies (ULBs). The campaign aimed to rekindle civic pride, strengthen public participation, and foster a sense of shared ownership in building cleaner, greener and more

sustainable cities.

# Ek Ped Maa Ke Naam

“Reduce Plastic, Restore the Planet”

In a heartfelt celebration of World Environment Day on 5 June 2025, the Housing & Urban Development Department (H&UDD), J&K, launched the “Ek Ped Maa Ke Naam” campaign across all 80 Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) in the Union Territory. Rooted in the touching sentiment of planting a tree in one’s mother’s name, the initiative beautifully combines emotional connection with ecological responsibility. In Srinagar, the flagship event was organized at Eco Park, led by Mrs. Mandeep Kaur, Commissioner Secretary to the Government, H&UDD, along with Mr. Owais Ahmed Rana, Commissioner, Srinagar Municipal Corporation (SMC). At the same time, the Jammu Municipal Corporation (JMC) launched its drive under the “Clean Jammu, Green Jammu” campaign, where Commissioner Mr. Devansh Yadav planted the inaugural sapling.

Going beyond symbolic plantation, the campaign emphasizes sustained stewardship. Each sapling is tagged with a QR code for digital tracking and public monitoring, ensuring transparency and long-term care. ULBs were assigned tiered plantation targets — 500 trees for Committees, 5,000 for Councils, and an ambitious 20,000 trees each for JMC and SMC. Plantation sites were carefully identified in collaboration with the Forest Department, covering residential colonies, office campuses, public parks, riverbanks like the Tawi front, and roadside green belts. ULBs that surpass their targets will be recognized and felicitated for their contribution to environmental protection. The plantation drive will continue till the end of June, reinforcing the department’s commitment to a greener, cleaner, and more sustainable Jammu & Kashmir.



# “PLASTIC OUT – FABRIC IN” Campaign

## Championing Local Alternatives for Everyday Sustainability

To curb the widespread use of single-use plastic, the “Plastic Out – Fabric In” campaign was launched to promote sustainable alternatives across high-footfall areas such as marketplaces, spiritual sites and popular tourist destinations.

Under this initiative, eco-friendly fabric bag kiosks were strategically installed to make sustainable choices convenient and accessible. These fabric bags were locally crafted by women-led Self Help Groups (SHGs) and microenterprises—turning the campaign into a dual-purpose mission of environmental protection and economic empowerment.



The response from the public was overwhelmingly positive. Citizens welcomed the affordability and practicality of these alternatives, with many eagerly switching to fabric bags. By providing accessible, attractive options, the campaign effectively reduced dependence on plastic and fostered a culture of mindful consumption.

Beyond its immediate impact, “Plastic Out – Fabric In” delivered a powerful message: lasting change emerges from the synergy of policy, participation, and community empowerment. By enabling local producers and engaging the public, the initiative became a model of inclusive sustainability, showing how environmental stewardship and social upliftment can thrive together when supported by thoughtful interventions.

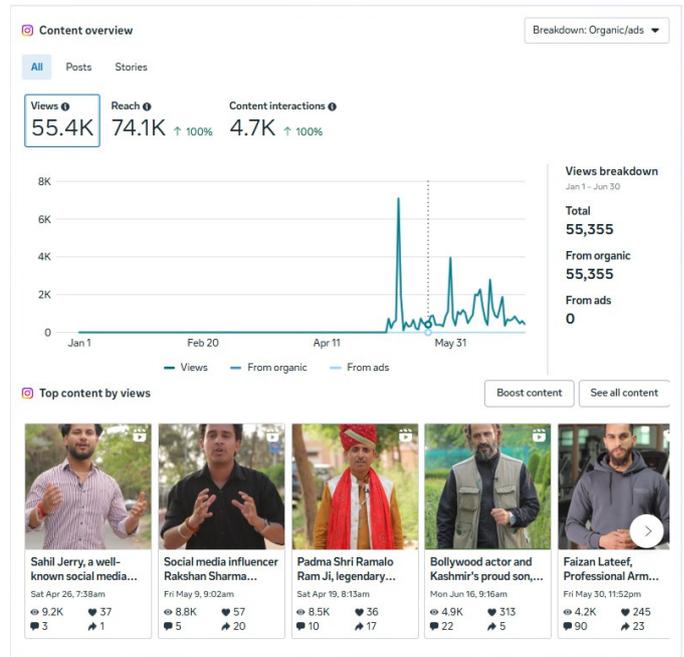
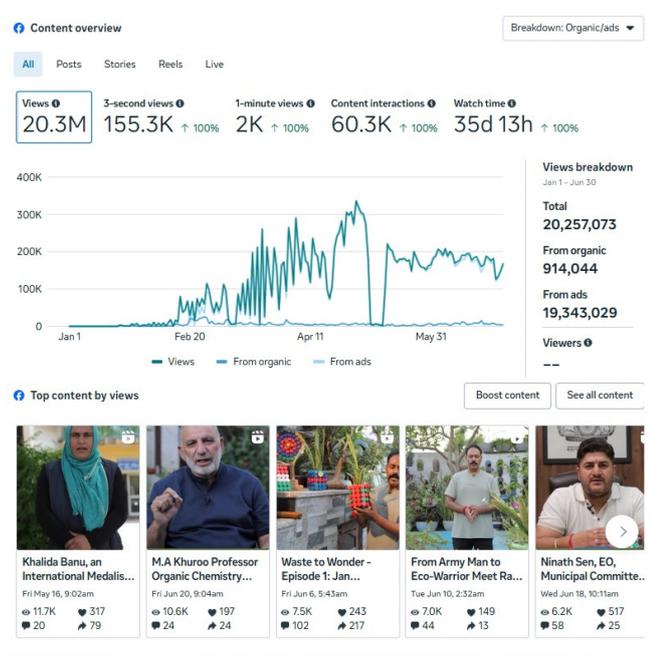
# Creation of Social Media Handles & Development of Creatives

# Bas Ek Minute: One Minute for a Cleaner Tomorrow

“Connecting Online, Inspiring On-Ground Action”

In an era of constant rush, where every minute feels fleeting, the Housing & Urban Development Department (HU&DD) under the Swachh Bharat Mission–Urban 2.0 introduced a beautifully simple yet deeply impactful campaign “**Bas Ek Minute.**” This innovative initiative reminded citizens that transformation doesn’t always demand grand gestures; sometimes, all it takes is one mindful minute. A single act of responsibility picking up a piece of litter, segregating household waste, or guiding someone to use the right bin can ripple into a larger wave of cleanliness and civic pride. A Movement Born from a Minute The campaign turned the idea of Swachhata into a personal habit. Every Urban Local Body (ULB) across Jammu & Kashmir was encouraged to creatively capture the spirit of this initiative by producing short one-minute videos that demonstrated small yet powerful acts of cleanliness in daily life. From bustling markets and schools to scenic parks and busy bus stands, citizens were seen taking a minute to clean, educate and inspire others. These videos not only showcased civic discipline but also became mirrors reflecting the collective conscience of a responsible community. Digital Storytelling Meets Civic Action The “Bas Ek Minute” campaign thrived on participation and creativity. Citizens young and old alike were invited to join an open video challenge, recording and sharing their own one-minute actions for Swachhata. The best entries from each ULB were featured on official social media pages of Mission Directorate SBM-U

2.0, transforming local efforts into digital inspiration. The initiative merged storytelling with social responsibility, using short videos as a medium to spread awareness, inspire imitation and normalize cleanliness as a natural part of everyday life. Through these vibrant clips, people saw familiar faces shopkeepers, students, sweepers, and homemakers becoming changemakers, proving that one minute of care is worth far more than hours of neglect. From Awareness to Habit What began as a creative campaign soon became a behavioural nudge. “Bas Ek Minute” reshaped public perception of cleanliness not as an obligation, but as an act of daily mindfulness. It encouraged everyone to pause, reflect, and act to take that one minute that could prevent a drain from clogging, a park from littering, or a plastic bag from entering a water stream. This initiative also empowered Urban Local Bodies to communicate effectively through digital media, fostering positive competition among cities to lead by example in both creativity and cleanliness. A Minute That Moved a Movement In its essence, “**Bas Ek Minute**” captured the soul of the Swachh Bharat Mission collective change through individual action. It was a campaign that required no massive budgets or banners, only a willingness to act. And in every one-minute clip shared, a story of transformation unfolded stories of students cleaning playgrounds, shopkeepers maintaining spotless storefronts and citizens choosing responsibility over convenience.
